The Protection of our most Holy Lady Theotokos and Ever-Virgin Mary

October 1st, 2023

Assigned Readings

2 Corinthians 6:16-7:10, Hebrews 9:1-7

Luke 6:31-36, Luke 10:38-42; 11:27-28

Festal Commemoration:

This miraculous appearance of the Mother of God occurred in the mid-tenth century in Constantinople, in the Blachernae church. On Sunday, October 1, during the All-Night Vigil, when the church was overflowing with those at prayer, the Fool-for-Christ Saint Andrew, at the fourth hour, lifted up his eyes towards the heavens and beheld our most Holy Lady Theotokos coming through the air, resplendent with heavenly light and surrounded by an assembly of the Saints. Saint John the Baptist and the holy Apostle John the Theologian accompanied the Queen of Heaven.

After completing her prayer, she took her veil and spread it over the people praying in church, protecting them from enemies both visible and invisible. The Most Holy Lady Theotokos was resplendent with heavenly glory, and the protecting veil in her hands gleamed "more than the rays of the sun." Saint Andrew gazed trembling at the miraculous vision and he asked his disciple, the blessed Epiphanius standing beside him, "Do you see, brother, the Holy Theotokos, praying for all the world?" Epiphanius answered, "I do see, holy Father, and I am in awe."

The Ever-Blessed Mother of God implored the Lord Jesus Christ to accept the prayers of all the people calling on His Most Holy Name, and to respond speedily to her intercession, "O Heavenly King, accept all those who pray to You and call on my name for help. Do not let them go away from my icon unheard."

The protective intercession of the Mother of God was needed because of an attack by a large pagan Russian fleet. The feast celebrates the divine destruction of the fleet which threatened Constantinople itself. Ironically, this Feast is considered more important by the Slavs than by the Greeks.

Tone 8 - Troparion (Resurrection)

Thou didst des<u>cend</u> from on <u>high</u>, O <u>Mer</u>ciful One!
Thou didst ac<u>cept</u> the <u>three</u> day burial to free us from our <u>suf</u>ferings!// O Lord, our <u>Life</u> and Resur<u>rec</u>tion, <u>glo</u>ry to Thee!

Tone 4 - Troparion (*Protection*)

Today the faithful celebrate the <u>feast</u> with joy, illumined by thy coming, O <u>Mother</u> of God.

Beholding thy pure image, we fervently <u>cry</u> to thee: "Encompass us beneath the precious veil of thy pro<u>tection</u>; deliver us from every form of <u>evil</u> by entreating Christ, thy <u>Son</u> and our God,// that He may save our souls."

Tone 8 - Kontakion (Resurrection)

By rising <u>from</u> the <u>tomb</u>, Thou didst raise the dead and resurrect <u>Ad</u>am. Eve exults <u>in</u> Thy <u>Resurrection</u>,// and the world <u>cel</u>ebrates Thy <u>rising</u> from the dead, O greatly <u>Mer</u>ciful One!


Tone 3 - Kontakion (*Protection*)
